The Queen and her escort, Tom Tweed, then led the royal procession through an ivy covered arch, up the steps, to the throne on the stage.

The Stayton Eagles, who have yet to lose a Capital Conference game, defeated the Silver Foxes 39-38 at Stayton. Larry Zetterberg, Silverton's leading scorer scored 19 points. All of Silverton's field goals in the first half came from Zetterberg.

At the end of the first quarter Silverton led 11-7; Zetterberg scored 10 of those points.

In the second quarter the Stayton Eagles scored 10 straight points, before the Foxes hit a free throw to make the score 17-12.

Larry Zetterberg then hit a field goal to close the gap to 17-14. Bob Overfield was fouled by Mike Cruson, who protested the call, and a technical foul was called. Overfield made all three free throws to tie the score at 17 all. Stayton then scored a field goal and two free throws to lead 21-17 at half-time.

In the third quarter both teams scored 10 points each to make the score 31-27 in favor of Stayton.

In the fourth quarter Silverton tied the score 34, 35, and 37. Then Ken Ashley was fouled, his first foul shot was no good, but his second was, this gave the Foxes a 38-37 lead with only 29 seconds remaining.

With 1 second left 5'0" Paul Lucas hit a jump shot from the foul line to give the Stayton team their 7th straight conference win. Roger Ward lead the Stayton scoring with 15 points, Paul Lucas had 9 and Ken Ware 7.

Silverton's scoring was: Zetterberg (19), Overfield (6), Ashley (5), Graves (4), McKillop (4).

Grapplers Pin Bulldogs 33-16

Silverton's wrestlers broke in to the win column with a rousing 33-16 victory over the Woodburn Bulldogs, at WHS.

In the first match Clarence Dahlberg was decised by WHS's Peter Lamb. In the next match Levi Brown pinned Clifford Terry, to make the score 5-3, Silverton.

Mel Gregonis and WHS's Ludwig Roeder fought to a draw in the third match. Three consecutive matches went to the Foxes; Bob Vestal decised WHS's Stan Carter, Stewart Bye pinned David Zastopil, and Jerry Slayton decised Mike Kowash making the score 18-5, in favor of the Foxes.

The Bulldogs fought back, taking 2 matches from the Foxes, Charles DeGuire was pinned by WHS's Dick Beaty and SUHS's Dean Eggman lost a decision to Kelly Timm, making the score 18-13.

The Foxes bounced back, taking 15 points on three consecutive falls. George Baker, Jim Knauf, and Jim Heater pinned WHS's Paul Kowash, Ed Meinger, and Dick Schuh, respectively. In the last match, the heavyweight, Tom O'Brien lost a decision to Jim Thorpe of Woodburn for a final score of 33-16 in favor of the Foxes.

Of a total of 12 matches the Foxes won 7, five by falls and two by decisions, lost 4, one by a fall and 3 by decisions. There was 1 draw.

After the completion of the track, football and baseball fields, Silverton will have one of the best athletic fields in the state.

Cougars Trip Fox Wrestlers

Silverton's wrestling team lost in their first league appearance to the Cascade Cougars 31-21 on Thursday, Jan. 9.

Clarence Dahlberg and Van Duncan were both pinned by Cascade grapplers in the first 2 matches, making the score 10-0 in favor of the Cougars.

The next 3 bouts saw Mel Gregonis' decision his opponent and Bob Vestal and Stewart Bye winning by falls, putting the home forces ahead 13-10. Jerry Slayton lost by a decision and Butch Martin, the Foxes' most consistent winner, won by a fall.

The next two matches were give and take with Dean Eggman losing a decision and George Baker winning a decision, leaving the Foxes ahead 21-16.

Up to this point all the matches had been nip and tuck with the Foxes slightly ahead; then the bottom fell out, with Jim Heater, John Heater and Bill Charpillot all being pinned, but the boys made a fight of it before being held to the mat for the 2 seconds. The final score was 31-21 in favor of Cascade.
