Thursday's Elections Finds Feds as Pres. and Sec.: Nats Get V.P. Spot

The Student Body elections of SUHS were held early last Thursday, to determine who were to be the new Student Body officers for the first semester in 1958.

To the dismay of Nationalist party members, the office of Student Body President was again captured by the Federalist candidate, Larry Zetterberg was elected after a close race with Butch Martin.

Bob Kuenzi, Nationalist candidate, was elected to the office

of Vice President. The Secretarial position was won by Federalist Roberta Darnell.

Members of the Non-Partisan Committee stated that all three races were extremely close. It was said that the decision was made only after continuous re-counting of the votes.

The other two measures on the ballots, both proposed amendments to the Constitution, were passed.

The results of the election were announced shortly after sixth period began.

Federalist Convention Notes

1st Convention

The Feds and Nats., who have just ended their 'feudin' and 'fightin,' will again become friends after two weeks of being on the outs.

The students of the Federalist party chose a number from a hat and then were grouped accordingly to their number. Each number was that of a state Oregon, California, New York, Utah, and Montana.

Acting chairman were picked from each group and the poll was taken. After the roll, each state was to pick one student for each office which were President, Vice-President, and Secretary.

Nominees for vice-president for Feds were: Mike Rowe, Richard Klemmer, and Dean Eggiman. For Secretary were: Roberta Darnell, Janice Shulke, Tamara Tweed, Shirley Simpson and Wayne Fetters.

The convention for the Feds began at 11:00 Thursday, Jan. 2, 1958 in the multi-purpose room, adjourned at 12:00 for lunch, and continued up in the gym at 1:30.

The convention then continued with introductions and acceptance speeches of the candidates nominated. Following the speeches there were demonstrations for the candidates of the students choice.

All of the students who were backing Tom Tweed began to shout and yell because they heard he was unable to run for president because of a half day unexcused absence. Mr. Kahle called a special teachers meeting to decide whether he could run, and the convention stood idle.

Sometime later (45 min.) it was announced that it was a faculty policy that if a student had an unexcused absence, he or she could not hold a major school office.

The convention again resumed and Roberta Darnell was chosen candidate for the Fed., for the office of student body president.

Larry Zetterberg and Jim Heater were nominated for the office of president for the Feds after it was learned that Tom could not run. This brought the total down to 5 candidates that were running for the office of president for the Feds.

2nd Convention

The Federalist began their second convention Thursday, Jan. 9, at 11 a. m.

Jim Heater opened the convention with a prayer, followed by the flag salute, and roll call. Acceptance speeches for the candidacy of presidents were given

Nationalist Convention Notes

1st Convention

The Nationalist convention was begun Thursday, January ninth with skits and other ideas to further favorite candidates.

Nomination speeches were first on the agenda. The convention then adjourned for lunch.

Nationalist party members reconvened in the gym after lunch in the gymnasium. Pop was sold as a money raising idea for the Nationalist party. The rue of Newman for President started in the Federalist party and provided minor amusement and major diversion.

Poll of delegations in the race for secretary was begun and after a close race Verna Stumpff was chosen as the Nationalist candidate. Ann Lee, although not far behind, used sound judgment and conceded her position because of shortage of time.

A short campaign was carried on for Vice-President and after one poll, Bob Kuenzi was elected as the unanimous candidate over Merle Anderson.

The Vice Presidential voting was very close. Although the first ballot definitely gave evidence that Davin Ahnquist was out of the running. On the eighth ballot Tom Lynch was gaining and remained only fifteen votes behind. Since we had only a few minutes left to elect our candidate, he conceded to Butch Martin and sacrificed his own position for the good of the party.

2nd Convention

The Nationalist convention of Thursday, January 3, 1958, was called to order by Chairman John Skirvin.

The convention convened for the purpose of nominating candidates for secretary, vice-president, and president of the Student Body. Roll was taken first in the different delegations, the delegations being assigned in a lottery manner. The delegations consisted of: California, Oregon, Idaho, New York, Utah, and Washington. The acting chairman of each delegation then asked for nominations for the office of delegation chairman.

The nominees were judged according to grade point and scholastic standards. They were as follows: Oregon—Butch Martin, Utah—Pat Pasquin, New York—Bob Kuenzi, California—Patsy Rogers, Idaho—Lavonne Pelster, and Washington—Christine Hutton.

The chairman then asked for nominations for secretary. Ann Lee and Verna Stumpff were chosen. Vice presidential candidates were: Bob Kuenzi and Merle Anderson. Nominees for president were: Butch Martin from Oregon, Tom Lynch from Utah, and Davin Ahnquist, one of the convention officers.



Convention Contention

Political conventions in SUHS are a fine thing; that is an ad-"a little different," but also serve to enlighten students concerning the two real conventions which take place in the U. S. every four years.

But, in view of the last school conventions, both aims are not being carried out to the fullest extent. To say that the last convention (Federalist and Nationalist parties) will create something "a little different" in elections is the understatement of the year. But to say that it also showed an insight on the Republican-Democratic conventions is stretching things a little!

The mix-up which took place during the primary conventions cannot be blamed on any one person or group of persons. It was largely due to misunderstandings on the part of the Student Council, Non-Partisan Committee, Administration, Party Chairmen, and nearly everyone else connected with the functioning of the conventions.

Perhaps, if a better understanding of the convention set-up and the terms used in speaking of it had existed among the above-mentioned people, things would have gone more smoothly.

The conventions were help up by incomplete conception, or misunderstanding, of what was to be accomplished within the time limit (which is also a sore spot), and technical rules which had been overlooked or ignored.

It is our opinion that much of this could have been avoided, had all the groups involved in the organization of the conventions met earlier and discussed the situation more thoroughly. We hardly think that one (or at the most, two) weeks is time enough to plan the conventions. The matter was mentioned in Student Council some time before that, but no action appeared to be taken.

"Career Day," in comparison, is planned at least four months in advance. It seems to us that planning of this nature would certainly benefit the conventions. They might not be considered as important as Career Day, but they definitely deserve a lot more planning and consideration than they have been getting, if they are to be organized and run like the real ones.

We would like to suggest that considerable thought be given to this before the next convention time rolls around; many students remark that the conventions are boring, but do nothing in connection with making them any livelier. Perhaps, if more interest were taken in supporting candidates, staging rallies and demonstrations, and so on, things wouldn't be boring. Much of this could be carried on before the conventions actually began, in order to drum up support for the candidate within the party.

There are many other points to be considered, but space does not permit them to be listed here. We suggest that the people directly concerned with the convention's organization, prior to the next convention, straighten out a few things, agree on them, and make sure they are understood by the students.

Yamhill defeated the Silver Fox wrestlers 35-9 for their second win over the Foxes on December 19.

Winning matches by decisions for Silverton were Mel Gregonis, Butch Martin, and Jerry Schurter.

Losing by decisions were Bob Vestal, Stewart Bye, Tom Brown, George Baker, and John Heater. Pinned by Yamhill were Clarence Dahlberg, Van Duncan, and Jim Heater. Silverton got felled the heavyweight match. Final score: 35-9.

This was the wrestlers' fourth successive loss, having lost to Estacada, North Salem, and twice to Yamhill.

Foxes Nip Huskies

The Silver Foxes overpowered the North Marion Huskies by the score of 51 to 47.

When the first quarter started, North Marion came on the floor at top strength and took an early lead of 6 points. But this did not discourage the Foxes, it only made them angry, for when the quarter ended, they were ahead 6 points with the score of 16 to 10. In the second quarter the game was evenly matched and at the end of the first half, the scoreboard read 24 to 19, Foxes favor.

When the second half started, the Foxes were still the top team and ended the third quarter with the score of 35 to 28, but in the fourth quarter the dogs started narrowing the lead of the Foxes but they did not start soon enough, for when the game ended the score read 51 to 47 Foxes favor.

Warriors Scalp Foxes

The Lebanon Warriors used their backboard strength to down the Silverton Silver Foxes 48-32 on the home court.

Coch Don Reed, juggling his starting lineup by placing Russell Allman in Bob Overfield's guard spot and Dave Doerfler for Ken Ashley at center. At forwards Craig Clark and Allen Renback started in place of Jim McKillop and Bob Graves.

The Foxes, making bad passes and failing to hustle on the backboards, were no match for Lebanon, an A-1 school with an enrollment of over 1000 students. Lebanon led by Jim Phillips and Don Taylor who scored 13 points each.

Lebanon led 20-9 at the end of the first quarter and 30-14 at halftime. In the third quarter Lebanon outscored the Foxes by 2 points to increase their lead 30-21. On the brighter side the Foxes held the Warriors to 18-18 tie in the second half. The defeat was the third in a row for the Foxes.

In the second period, the Tigers fought back hard, but could not crack the Foxes rough zone defense, and only hit for 8 points but at the same time held the Foxes to 7 points. The half ended with Silverton on top 21-11.

In the third quarter it was all Silverton as McKillop took over and hit for 6 of the Foxes 11 points, while the Tigers couldn't get past 6 in the third or fourth. And the Silvertons led going into the fourth quarter 33-20.

The final period found Silverton slowed to 8 points with McKillop hitting for 5. The game ended with the Foxes on the long end at a 41-26 score.

Serra Tops Foxes

The Foxes, playing a very cold floor game, were behind all the way as their usually-tough zone defense cracked wide open to let the Sabers pour in 49 points.

The first period started off with the Sabers' sharp shooting captain Denny Frank hitting for 5 points as the Serra team rolled up a 9-5 quarter score.

The second quarter found the Foxes still ice-cold as they hit for 6 to the Sabers' 11, and the half ended with Serra out in front, 20-11.

In the third period the Foxes tallied eleven points but failed to close the gap any, as the tough Serra club went out in front 33-22.

The fourth quarter was all Serra as the Sabers poured in 16 points to Silverton's 10. Frank and LaBr paced the Sabers with 13 each, while Ashley led the Foxes with 10 counters. The game ended with Serra on top 49-32.
